

Health Care

Canada has an excellent healthcare system, with a high standard quality of care. Although, there are occasional complaints about the lack of general practitioners.



Medicare

Medicare is a government-funded national insurance scheme that's administered provincially, to give citizens affordable access to public and private hospitals, clinics, and general practitioners. However, not all international citizens are eligible to enjoy Medicare Services.

Public Healthcare

Although Medicare provides comprehensive health access, you must still pay for medicines, ambulance services, dental and eye care.

Private Healthcare

Most healthcare facilities in Canada are privately owned. If you are unable to enjoy Medicare services, health insurance may be required.

Pharmacies

Medicines are generally expensive, but you can claim most costs through Medicare or private insurance.


Emergency Services

Paramedics in Canada are highly trained and fully equipped. However, in some territories or provinces, you must pay more to get emergency services.

Transportation in Canada

Exploring Canada is quite easy thanks to its excellent transportation system of roads, rail, in-city and out-of-town buses, ferries, and bike trails.

• Bus	• Taxi
The buses within and between cities in Canada are very clean, comfortable, and efficient. Greyhound Canada has over 1,000 destinations and partners with independent transport operators within the region.	Taxis in Canada are strictly regulated, with a registration number on the bumper back of the cab. You are expected to tip the taxi driver about 10% of the total fare.
• Bike	• Train
The Canada government is working hard to promote cycling, with hundreds of miles of bicycle paths in major cities. Helmet usage is mandatory in most provinces, and some cities have bicycle sharing systems.	Some cities in Canada, including Toronto, Montre and Vancouver, have express trains. Whilst other cities such as Ottawa, Calgary, and Edmonton ha LRT (tram) systems.



• Ferry

With an extensive network of inland waterways, ferries are an important part of Canadian public transport. Cities such as Toronto, Vancouver, Quebec and Halifax make use of ferries for pedestrian, bicycle, car and cargo transportation. The ferry fee is quite reasonable, but advanced reservation is highly recommended if you plan to bring a car.

Cost of Living

The cost of living varies according to the city in which the residents live and the lifestyle of each individual. The average living cost required by each student in general starts from CAD15,000 - CAD18,000 per year. This fee covers the cost of accommodation, meals, transportation, and telecommunications and other daily necessities.



Student Visa & Health Insurance

Student visas issued to international students provide permission to work both on campus and off campus. Full-time students and their dependents (dependent students) can take part-time jobs for a maximum of 20 hours per week during college and work full-time 40 hours during holidays. After graduating from an academic program, students can have employment opportunities in Canada for up to three years. In addition, students also can take part in the Co-operative Education (Co-op) program, which is a program for students to experience first-hand jobs in the field being studied for a certain period. Some Co-ops even pay these students. You can intern for a full semester and then return to college or take the Co-op program several times during the lecture period.



Important Documents

Make sure you have the following documents with you to avoid unnecessary obstacles such as:

- Passports and other identity cards.
- International driving license
- Acceptance letter
- Your HSBC Premier debit and / or credit card, to make your transactions easier wherever you are.

List of Departure Preparations



1. Make sure your passport is still valid.

It is strongly recommended to do a passport renewal if the expiry date is close to your departure, as renewing a passport abroad will be a challenging process.

2. List of visas or study permits.

To study in Canada, you will need a study permit. A study permit is generally valid for the duration of your education, plus an additional 90 days. Visitor visa or electronic travel authorization may also be required.

3. Find suitable accommodations.

Some universities offer dormitories or townhouses, and if you live on campus, you may have the opportunity to sign up for a meal plan. Another alternative is to rent accommodation near campus or moving in with other students.

4. Open a banking account.

Start the process of opening an HSBC account in the destination country from now on so you can get an overseas HSBC account, debit card, or credit card before you depart (terms and conditions apply).

Make sure you have all the required documents prepared before departure, including passports, visas, communications and contacts from the university.




