Timezone

The United States has six different time zones and a number of states have different time zones such as Alabama and Alaska. Almost all states apply Daylight Saving Time from March to November by adjusting the time one hour early.

Climate

The United States has four seasons with varying climates.

The four seasons are:

- Summer: June August
- Fall: September November
- Winter: December February
- Spring: March May

Public Holiday

- Winter holidays in December January
- Spring holidays are between March and April
- Summer holidays from June to August, depending on whether the student take summer classes, which are generally optional.

Health Care

United States healthcare facilities are considered one of the best in the world. For citizens who have private insurance, they can enjoy health facilities. However, residents who do not have insurance have the risk of not being able to use health facilities at all, or have to getting a hefty medical bill.



Health Facilities

In the United States, ownership of the healthcare system is mainly in private hands, there is no healthcare system government, as in Canada or Europe. The overall quality of healthcare is good and many of the best specialist doctors can be found in the United States.

However, patients are expected to pay before they can receive medical care, unless they are in an emergency. Therefore, high-cost surgeries or long-term hospice care is usually not an option for those without insurance.



Pharmacies

Many department stores in the United States have a pharmacy section for medicine. You can also find pharmacies by clinics and hospitals. The price for medicine can be costly, and you must keep the receipts in order to make a claim to your health insurance company.



Emergency Facilities

The 911 emergency number encompasses the police, fire department and ambulance. Emergency services are regulated by the states and are accessible to the public.

Transportation in the United States

Public transport in the United States include buses, trains, trams, subways and ferries. While traveling between cities will require you to take bus or plane. In the East Coast area, the train line is also quite popular.

Most large cities in the United States have a transport system, most commonly a bus system. Metropolitan areas such as San Francisco, New York or Boston have very reliable transport systems, therefore personal transport is usually unnecessary to get around the cities. However personal transport will be needed if you live in a small town or routinely make long trips.



Public Transport

Traffic congestion is a common ailment of the metropolitan areas. Therefore, most city-dwellers opt to take public transports. The cost is generally cheap and discounts are usually available for students and seniors. Some of the larger cities have trams, taxis are also available to hail on the streets. In smaller cities and towns, however, buses are more limited and taxis need to be reserved.

City to City Transport

America has well-maintained highways that span 6 million kilometers. If you are looking to travel between cities, bus companies such as Greyhound have routes available that can help you get to your destination. If you opt to travel by rail, Amtrak, America's passenger railroad service has over 500 destinations.

Air Transport

The United States has a modern air transport system, with 8 out of the 30 busiest airports in the world operating on US soil, and over 200 domestic airline companies.

However, make sure you have allotted time for immigration and security processing, as US airports are infamous for their slow and sometimes unfriendly service, especially for international flights.

Living Costs & Importants Documents



Cost of Living

Living costs in the US will vary depending on where you live and your personal lifestyle. Larger cities such as New York, San Francisco and Los Angeles, for instance, will have higher living costs compared to smaller cities. In general, a student would need approximately **USD1,500** to **USD2,500** per month, which would include costs for accommodation, food, transport, communication and other daily needs.



Student Visa & Health Insurance

International students are required to take full-time studies in order to be eligible for the student visa. All international students in the United States whether they are going to university or taking a language course are required to have an F-1 visa. There are also J-1 visas for academic or cultural exchange students; and an M-1 visa for students taking a non-academic or vocational course in the United States. Before you can receive a student visa, a SEVIS-generated document called an I-20 must be issued by an institution in the United States as a proof of admittance for a student. SEVIS or The Student and Exchange Visitor System is a collection of online data of all international students issued by the Department of Homeland Security, or DHS.



Important Documents

Make sure you have the following documents with you to avoid unnecessary obstacles such as:

- Passports and other identity cards.
- International driving license
- Acceptance letter

List of Departure Preparations



1. Make sure your passport is still valid.

It is strongly recommended to do a passport renewal if the expiry date is close to your departure, as renewing a passport abroad will be a challenging process.



2. Complete your university and visa application.

You can only apply for a student visa after you have been accepted at a university in the United States that is certified by the Student and Exchange Visitor Program (SEVP). Applying for a visa will also require an interview. 3. Find appropriate accommodations.

There are two types of accommodations for students in the US: within campus grounds (dormitories), or outside of campus (houses and homestays). Make sure you are aware of the facilities offered by the university as some have special dorms for international students, which can help you or your loved ones to make friends with those sharing a similar journey.



4. Open a bank account.

Start the process of opening an HSBC account as soon as possible in order to have an account number, a debit card or an international HSBC credit card before your departure abroad (terms and conditions apply).

5. Fix a budget.

6. Health check.

You may be asked to get vaccinated or get a health check before you enter the United States. Vaccination for diseases such as mumps and measles are mandatory. You can find a list of the most current mandatory vaccinations at cdc.gov.



7. Travel insurance.

Travel insurance can be very helpful for any problems during your trip, such as late or lost baggage.



8. Double-check required documents.

In the days before your departure, double check to make sure that you have all the documents you will need, including your passport, visa, communications and university contacts.
